Last year they made a 24,000-mile trip to Europe and Africa, covering the territory in record time.

A new color movie, "The Magic Shelf," was presented by a soup company following a sumptuous luncheon. Dozens of easy-to-make dishes were demonstrated, using canned soups as the basis. One of the dishes was the following:

#### PERFECT TUNA CASSEROLE

1 can (1 1/4 cups) condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1 7-ounce can (1 cup) tuna, drained and coarsely flaked  
1 1/2 cups crushed potato chips  
1 cup unsalted cooked green peas, drained

Empty soup into a small casserole; add milk and mix thoroughly. Add tuna, 1 cup potato chips and peas to soup; stir well. Sprinkle top with remaining 1/2 cup potato chips. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 20 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

#### Crunchy Chicken Casserole

Follow proportions and directions for Perfect Tuna Casserole but make it with cream of celery soup, salmon, cheese crackers, and unsalted cooked green beans (drained).

Lobster Mushroom Casserole: Follow proportions and directions for Perfect Tuna Casserole but make it with lobster instead of tuna.
