

# Friends, Critics Admired Dulles

John Foster Dulles lived long enough to know before he died that among his countrymen he had no enemies and that his critics and opponents liked and admired him. This is unusual and significant. For Dulles was a highly controversial figure in a dangerous time, and when we have explained to ourselves why at the end he stands out above his battles, we shall have paid him a fitting tribute.

The explanation does not lie in this or that policy or in any moral generalization. It lies in the great tradition of what is required of a man in his public and his private life. The eulogies speak of him as a dedicated man, and in the exact sense of that over-used word he was dedicated to the function of a public servant.

Perhaps the highest function of a public servant in a free and democratic society is to preserve its oneness as a community while he fights the battles which divide it. John Foster Dulles never lost sight of that.

Poulsen recalled some curious behavior on the part of one of the females. During mating season, she showed obvious interest in one of the flamingo males after he had chosen a mate. She kept following him and his mate around, even after the male had tried to drive her off.

"I believe," Poulsen said, "that she laid that extra egg in the pair's nest. She certainly was trying to create a triangle situation. What is going to be interesting is to see if both those eggs hatch. If they do, we can guess that she was successful."

Unmated female birds can lay eggs but the eggs are infertile.




