and the health service to get together on the fence. The board members also support the vaccination and extermination program.

The 106 cases confirmed in the county include two horses, two cats, a calf, a burro, a bat, a cow and 98 dogs. All but 17 of these dogs were unvaccinated strays.

The Livestock Department has estimated that there are 100,000 to 120,000 dogs in the county and that 80 to 90 per cent of them have been vaccinated against the disease. The vaccination must be repeated every two years.

Unvaccinated stray dogs from both sides of the border pose the major threat, although there is a potential danger from foxes, coyotes and other ground animals and from bats.

"Our most effective control in preventing the spread of rabies is the elimination of stray dogs and the vaccination of all dogs," Dr. J. B. Askew, county health director, has said.

"Dogs should not be allowed to run loose. When a dog is not confined to the premises of the owner, it should be kept on a leash."
